School Description and Mission Statement (School Year 2009-10)

Alicia Reyes Elementary School is a traditional calendar school serving grades kindergarten through fifth. It lies in the Southwest part of the city of Merced, near Merced Municipal Airport. As its top priority, the entire staff of Reyes Elementary School strives to meet the social, emotional, and physical needs of students. The teachers and staff at Reyes Elementary School are dedicated to ensuring that our students come away with a well-rounded educational experience that will serve them well in the future.

Alicia Reyes Elementary School's vision is, "Discovering Our Potential". The mission of Alicia Reyes Elementary School is to partner with parents and students to work together to achieve students fullest potential academically and socially in life as citizens of the world: "Watch Us Fly!"

Opportunities for Parental Involvement (School Year 2009-10)

Parents will be actively involved in their children's education. Parents will be encouraged to participate in school programs in a variety of ways: volunteering in the classroom; attending parent education night meetings; participating in multicultural activities; serving on site committees; attending literacy classes; and making classroom observations. Effective parenting is essential if children are to succeed in school. We recognize the need to continue to build bridges to our parent community. Beyond the governance role that formal school structures provide, we need to establish informal networks of collaboration. Regular communication about student progress via support programs such as CBET and parenting classes/workshops and roles for parent participation in supporting their child's home study are provided to parents. Teachers communicate regularly with parents about each students' progress and school events through conferences, phone calls, weekly homework packets, and written letters/flyers in Spanish and Hmong languages. They encourage parents to help their students to succeed in school by visiting classes, becoming engaged with students in homework activities, listening and talking to their child. If the home language is not English, parents are encouraged to work with students in their home language and participate in the English Learner Advisory Committee.

III. School Climate

School Safety Plan (School Year 2009-10)

This section provides information about the school's comprehensive safety plan.

Procedures are in place to follow in the event of a natural or manmade disaster, which includes student supervision, facility monitoring and parental notification. The school safety plan is designed to create an orderly, purposeful, and safe school environment by allowing its teachers to effectively teach and all students to actively learn. Effective teaching, regardless of how inspired and meaningful, regardless of how eagerly it is sought, can only take place and flourish in a school that provides for the physical, emotional, and psychological safety and well being of its students and staff. Procedures are in place for monitoring campus visitors. All visitors go to the school office to sign-in and get a pass which alerts staff to authorized visitors. All administrators, office personnel, and custodians carry 2-way radios to maintain immediate communication capability. All assigned yard duty personnel on the playground carry 2-way radios while on duty to ensure quick communication with the office in case of emergencies. Reyes Elementary School has a philosophy of providing good discipline to promote a safe, comfortable, and friendly learning environment. The Reyes School Code of Conduct provides students with the foundation necessary to grow scholastically. Reyes School enforces the Student Disciplinary Action Matrix developed by the district in order to provide students with opportunities to learn self-discipline through a system of consistent consequences for their behavior. Teachers have developed a positive discipline program and hold periodic classroom meetings to ensure the growth of students' problem solving skills as well as the development of interpersonal skills. Reyes School believes students will develop a sense of personal responsibility by observing its disciplinary policies and will consequently benefit from them. Parents and students are informed of discipline policies, rules, regulations, and the reward system at the start of each school year through classroom postings, student handbooks, and the district's Parent Information Booklet.

IX. Student Performance

Standardized Testing and Reporting Program

The Standardized Testing and Reporting (STAR) Program consists of several key components, including the California Standards Tests (CSTs); the California Modified Assessment (CMA), and the California Alternate Performance Assessment (CAPA). The California Standards Tests (CSTs) show how well students are doing in relation to the state content standards. The CSTs include English-language arts (ELA) and mathematics in grades 2 through 11; science in grades 5, 8, and 9 through 11; and history-social science in grades 8, and 10 through 11. The CAPA includes ELA, mathematics, and science in grades 2 through 11, and for science for grades 5, 8 and 10. The CAPA is given to those students with significant cognitive disabilities whose disabilities prevent them from taking either the CSTs with accommodations or modifications or the CMA with accommodations. The CMA includes ELA and mathematics for grades 3 through 8 and science in grade 5 and is an alternate assessment that is based on modified achievement standards. The CMA is designed to assess those students whose disabilities preclude them from achieving grade-level proficiency on an assessment of the California content standards with or without accommodations. Student scores are reported as performance levels. XII. National Assessment of Educational Progress

National Assessment of Educational Progress

The National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP) is a nationally representative assessment of what America's students know and can do in various subject areas. Assessments are conducted periodically in mathematics, reading, science, writing, the arts, civics, economics, geography, and U.S. history. Student scores for reading and mathematics are reported as performance levels (i.e., basic, proficient, and advanced) and the participation of students with disabilities and English language learners is reported based on three levels (identified, excluded, and assessed). Detailed information regarding the NAEP results for each grade, performance level, and participation rate can be found on the [National Assessment of Educational Progress](#) Web page (Outside Source).

Note: Only a sample group of California's schools and districts participate in the NAEP testing cycle. Therefore, students in any particular school or district may not be included in these results. The NAEP reflects state test results and is not reflective of either the LEA or the individual school. Comparisons of student performance on the NAEP and student performance on the Standardized Testing and Reporting (STAR) Program assessments cannot be made without an understanding of the key differences between the two assessment programs. For example, the NAEP only assesses grades four, eight and twelve and for long-term trends assesses grades nine, thirteen, and seventeen. Additionally, the NAEP only provides state test results for grades four and eight. The California Standards Tests (CSTs) are based on a different set of standards than the NAEP assessments. For example, the NAEP is not aligned with California academic content and achievement standards and, therefore, does not necessarily reflect the curriculum and instruction to which students are exposed in the classroom. The NAEP assesses reading and writing separately, while the CSTs assess English-language arts (ELA), encompassing reading as well as writing conventions, spelling, and grammar. Scores on the CSTs and other assessments are not directly comparable to those on NAEP. The averages and percentages presented are estimates based on samples of students rather than on entire populations. Finally, the questions students respond to are only a sample of the knowledge and skills covered by the NAEP frameworks.
